Case Study

Texas has been working since 2005 to integrate all jail and records management systems in the state for criminal justice information sharing purposes. The project referred to as Texas Data Exchange (TDEX) is supervised by the Texas Department of Public Safety. While the work of connecting these systems has been going on, members of criminal justice have been accessing both national booking data and the systems connected so far through what is referred to as the JusticeXchange Web portal (www.appriss.com/justicexchange). Also, Texas wanted to share its data with the FBI N-DEX project, so Appriss has developed an approved interface to share data with N-DEX. This has allowed Texas criminal justice agencies to access the data through both the JusticeXchange Web portal and the FBI N-DEX Web portal.
